# Why Buy a TVIH Raffle Ticket

Due to a renewed zeal for myth-busting in recent months, below are several regularly voiced myths about our current 50-50 raffle and "the facts-just the facts."

Myth: I pay my membership fees and that's enough.

Membership fees make up about 40% of the revenue

needed to run the Village.

**Myth:** Since the Village office has been closed, expenses have been lower during the past year and therefore we must have saved money.

Actually, while rent was less last year, computer and other administrative costs were higher due to Zoom contracts and the need to supplement staff time to help with increased virtual programming. Additionally, CA has ended the rent moratorium and we are again paying rent!.

**Myth:** The fundraising committee got lots of grant money during the past year, so certainly we don't need to fundraise now.

The money we received prevented us from using up our reserves during the past year, but if we want the Village to be sustainable for coming years, we need to fund for next year, not drain our accounts!

Myth: It's someone else's turn to give money to the Village.

That's why we're asking you to sell a ticket and publicize the raffle — so friends and neighbors share the cost of the Village!

**Myth:** A big foundation is waiting in the wings to fund the Village.

Guess again. Please ask yourself who benefits from the Village? If you're a member, do you enjoy the programs? Do you benefit from the information and outreach TVIH offers? If you're a full member, do you appreciate the services you receive? If you're not a member, but "tune in" to our public events and agree that the Village concept is important in helping our elders age in community, shouldn't you be pitching in to keep the Village thriving in case you need it?

Myth: I won't win the raffle.

Now that's absolutely true...you won't have a chance to win the raffle if you don't buy a ticket — but someone will!

A New Restaurant in the Developing Area of the Merriweather District

The Clove & Cardamom features a globally inspired Indian menu for enjoyment in a new modern décor. The menu offers a wide variety of choices including tandoori grill, flatbread pizzas, street tacos, salads, soups, entrees and, of course, desserts. Descriptions of each food choice is included. If you were interested in the Masala Alfredo Pasta, you could have a choice of protein with penne pasta simmered in tempered cumin, veggies and blended spices. We had the Tandoori Wings (good), Khow Suey Noodle Soup (tasty and filling), and Garlic-Chili shrimp (very spicy and tasty). The Masala tea was a nice addition. The Clove apple cake with Cardamom ice cream was shared along with comments of "yummy and delicious" and "can I lick my plate!"

Parking for the restaurant was plentiful in the lot across the street. We found the service to be excellent and the prices reasonable. The music was loud when we entered but immediately lowered when requested. The restaurant became noisy as the number of customers increased. We enjoyed both the food and the restaurant

# Howard County General Hospital will hold Free Drive-through Health Screenings

Howard County General Hospital will hold free drive-through health screenings and risk assessments for body mass index, stroke, blood pressure, prediabetes, blood glucose and HDL cholesterol. The drive-through screenings will take place Saturday, May 15, from noon to 4 p.m. at St John Baptist Church at 9055 Tamar Drive in Columbia. Participants can also receive healthy lifestyle education and information on classes offered to address health risks.

### Village to Village – Jim Sanders

The Biden Administration is reviewing Village programs to determine whether the Villages might potentially partner with 50+ or other aging agencies to better serve those in isolation and aging in place. The federal government's review of 350 Village organizations noted already that many villages are extensions of local government and community aging services. Montgomery County has eight villages coordinated by the County Government. Since close-by Montgomery County benefits from strong support of its local government, it may be in our interest to seek information that would be useful in helping TVIH discover how we could work more effectively with our county.

The review also noted differences in Village size. Many are very small neighborhood or home owners associations while other villages are very large. The Capital Hill DC Village has 400 members and 150 non-member volunteers. The village in Denver has 1800 members.

Villages typically provide support services including transportation, home maintenance, and neighborhood assistance. Most Villages also provide social services in the form of care coordination and they help members navigate health care, insurance, social service and housing . Most Villages are engaged in health assistance to their members. In contrast, TVIH provides more engagement in social activities and less in direct health access. Most Villages offer much more direct health activity to their members than we do.

# On Board Updates on Discussions by the TVIH Board March 24, 2021 Meeting

#### **Finances:**

TVIH has received funding from the Paycheck Protection Program which will be used for rent and utilities and the manager's salary. Despite this increase in funding our budget goal is to maintain a comfortable bank balance in spite of anticipated decreases in grant money. This can be achieved through work by the Communications group searching for sponsors, efforts by the Finance group researching grants and efforts by the Fund raising group on the 50-50 raffle and other fund raisers.

#### **Summer Camp at Stevens Forest Neighborhood Center**

The Adventures in Summer camp will resume its program at the Oakland Mills Neighborhood Center this summer. Oakland Mills manager, Sandy Cederbaum, has offered the use of the Thunder Hill Neighborhood Center for temporary storage of our furniture and supplies to make room for the camp. Move out date to be determined.

#### **Updating the Website**

Cheryl Neely reports this is a work in progress. The present focus is on a few simple updates in the About Us tab. Our landing page could also use updating to eliminate duplication of links and include a more dynamic introduction to the Village.

#### Strategic planning

The theme that runs through many of the Board discussions is the future of the Village. What do we need to survive? What should our functions be? This is apparent from the discussion on finances and the reports below. We're trying to determine what our niche is. Is it to address community, social and health needs; do we want to engage our membership to do more by helping our community to feed the hungry, mentor our children, and learn more about housing and education. Would broader community involvement provide the Village with greater recognition or allow the Village to become popular with a diverse community and increase membership? We have a good thing going at the Village and there is no reason we cannot be much better.

The terms of the Tri-Directors are coming to their end and members are invited to nominate their replacements and are encouraged to volunteer and take on leadership positions.

#### Membership

Member engagement remains a high priority for TVIH. Fran Dummett together with Cathy Latham and Stefanie Feldman, have established a Connections group whose goal is to reach out to associate members once or twice a month with a friendly check-in call. In addition, the new Connections Team has started to reach out to members to learn about their background, encourage interest in attending events, participate on TVIH Committees and become a volunteer for our Full Members. TVIH tries to leverage the skills of our members by inviting them to share their skills with the Village, - a former social worker could be invited to be an occasional Circle of Care Coordinator, a former IT worker could be invited to be on the IT Committee, etc.

#### **Volunteer Committee**

Marie Grunwell who co-chairs the Volunteer Committee, presented an assessment of what they need to be fully prepared to meet the needs of what is expected to be a growing and aging membership. She would like the Board to consider hiring a Volunteer Coordinator to coordinate volunteer services and training. This person will also act as a Circle of Care Coordinator on an as needed basis to assess a member's needs for "Circle" assistance and assemble a team of volunteers to service those needs. At present Marie does both jobs on a volunteer basis. She is concerned because a majority of volunteers from 2020 to the present have not been available due to COVID. There is no guarantee that they will come back if or when things return to normal.

# Village Pod Pilot **Program Update**

The Village Pod pilot study was completed at the end of April. Weekly pod reports from the conveners showed many positive feelings (e.g., interested in each other's stories) and some concerns (e.g., some pods took longer to gel than others). None of the reports showed any major issues that might need immediate attention. There was a general sense that small groups seem to have enhanced the ability of participants to communicate more comfortably and personally.

At the end of the pilot, each pod participant was asked to complete a short survey. Based on the feedback, the Village Pod Planning Committee will report on lessons learned and recommend whether a rollout of Village Pods to all TVIH members should be undertaken.
